

Parents' Guide to the Sixth Grade Religion Curriculum

Theme: To understand the Old Testament as the revelation of God in the history of a people, a revelation fulfilled in the New Testament.

As parents you are the first to nurture a love of God in your child. You introduce and model your faith for your child. We invite you to more fully understand what this year will bring to your child as they grow in their faith through the instruction they receive. In the sixth grade we hope to help your child become a conscious and active member of the Church through a greater understanding of the salvation history of God's people as it unfolds in the Old Testament.

The curriculum guidelines have been organized to reflect the *National Directory for Catechesis*, the U.S. Catholic Bishop's directives for passing on of the faith. Included in this pamphlet is a brief outline of the various components that make up the sixth grade curriculum your child should be exposed to throughout the year. Six Tasks of Catechesis

While Christ was on earth He formed His disciples by instructing them, praying with them, showing them how to live, and by passing down His mission to them. The *National Directory for Catechesis* has outlined Six Tasks that can best shape us in our Catholic Faith. The following tasks are covered at each grade level, but the content will adjust according to the scope and sequence of that grade level.

Here is a summary of the content for the sixth grade:

Task One: Knowledge of the Faith

- One way that God reveals Himself to mankind is through Sacred Scriptures which are inspired by the Holy Spirit with the cooperation of human writers.
- It is important to learn the story of salvation history because it is part of our story of faith in the Catholic Church.
- God created the heavens and the earth and revealed Himself in human history through the patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. Throughout the history of the Israelite people, God continued to love and care for them despite their failings.
- The Old Testament foretells and prefigures Jesus Christ who is the high point in salvation history.

Task Two: Knowledge of Liturgy and Sacraments

- Sacred Scripture is an important part of the Sacramental life of the Church. At each Mass there are numerous readings from the Sacred Scriptures as well as in each of the Sacraments
- Many of the events in the Old Testament prefigure the Sacraments in the Church.

Task Three: Moral Formation in Jesus Christ

- The foundation of the moral life in the Old Testament was the Ten Commandments. In the New Testament Jesus commands each person to continue following the Ten Commandments and gives the Church the Beatitudes to guide each person's moral choices.
- Christ gave us the Church to teach and guide in the ways of holiness and life. All men and women must form their consciences from the Church's teachings.
- A virtuous life leads us to becoming like God. The moral virtues grow through education, deliberate acts, and perseverance in struggle. God's grace purifies and strengthens us.
- Each person is called to practice the virtue of chastity in their life, this includes dressing modestly and guarding our thoughts, words, attitudes and actions.

Task Four: Teaches the Christian how to Pray with Christ

- God ceaselessly calls each person to a personal relationship with Him in prayer. Each person can respond to God's call by fostering a daily prayer life which includes both talking to God and listening to Him.
- Sacred Scriptures are a very important part of the prayer life of the Church. Wisdom Literature, the Psalms in particular, are especially helpful for prayer. Wisdom Literature provides reflections on the virtue of wisdom which can help each person to align their thoughts with the thoughts of God.
- A person can pray by themselves in personal prayer or with a group in communal prayer such as the Mass.

Task Five: Prepares the Christian to live in Community and to participate in the life and mission of the Church

- From the beginning of salvation history God desired for all mankind to live in community. God called the Patriarchs to faith, not just for themselves, but as part of a community.
- The Catholic Church continues the community that God called together with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

Task Six: Promotes a missionary spirit that prepares the faithful to be present as Christians in Society

- The faith that was revealed to the Patriarchs is a faith for all people. Through our Baptism each person is called to share their faith with the entire world.
- The same Holy Spirit who inspired the prophets to speak God's word still inspires people today.

Additional Components

In God's Image

- God the father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit are a community of love that we call the Holy Trinity.
- God created man and woman in His image. Man and woman are the highest of all creatures and are made to love and serve God.
- God made humans as man and woman. Man and woman complete and compliment each other.
